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learning a foreign language is much easier when it is approached with a knowledge of language structure grammar but many students find grammar mystifying this text explains points of grammar straightforwardly using examples from several widely studied languages including english so that students can see how the same principles work across different languages and how the structures of different languages correspond both formally and functionally the use of concrete examples makes grammar less abstract and easier to grasp allowing students to relate what they are learning to knowledge that they already possess unconsciously it simultaneously brings that knowledge up to a conscious level

this is the second of the two closely linked but self contained volumes that comprise james hurford's acclaimed exploration of the biological evolution of language in the first book he looked at the evolutionary origins of meaning ending as our distant ancestors were about to step over the brink to modern language he now considers how that step might have been taken and the consequences it undoubtedly had the capacity for language lets human beings formulate and express an unlimited range of propositions about real or fictitious worlds it allows them to communicate these propositions often overlaid with layers of nuance and irony to other humans who can then interpret and respond to them these processes take place at breakneck speed using a language means learning a vast number of arbitrary connections between forms and meanings and rules on how to manipulate them both of which a normal human child can do in its first few years of life james hurford looks at how this miracle came about the book is divided into three parts in the first the author surveys the syntactic structures evident in the communicative behaviour of animals such as birds and whales and discusses how vocabularies of learned symbols could have evolved and the effects this had on human thought in the second he considers how far the evolution of grammar depended on biological or cultural factors in the third and final part he describes the probable route by which the human language faculty and languages evolved from simple beginnings to their

present complex state

joan bybee and her colleagues present a new theory of the evolution of grammar that links structure and meaning in a way that directly challenges most contemporary versions of generative grammar this study focuses on the use and meaning of grammatical markers of tense aspect and modality and identifies a universal set of grammatical categories the authors demonstrate that the semantic content of these categories evolves gradually and that this process of evolution is strikingly similar across unrelated languages through a survey of seventy six languages in twenty five different phyla the authors show that the same paths of change occur universally and that movement along these paths is in one direction only this analysis reveals that lexical substance evolves into grammatical substance through various mechanisms of change such as metaphorical extension and the conventionalization of implicature grammaticalization is always accompanied by an increase in frequency of the grammatical marker providing clear evidence that language use is a major factor in the evolution of synchronic language states the evolution of grammar has important implications for the development of language and for the study of cognitive processes in general
