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a companion to literature in film provides state of the art research on world literature film and the complex theoretical relationship between them 25 essays by international experts cover the most important topics in the study of literature and film adaptations covers a wide variety of topics including cultural thematic theoretical and genre issues discusses film adaptations from the birth of cinema to the present day explores a diverse range of titles and genres including film noir biblical epics and italian and chinese cinema

this book about teachers as characters in popular media examines what can be learned from fictional teachers for the purposes of educating real teachers its aim is twofold to examine the constructed figure of the teacher in film television and text and to apply that examination in the context of teacher education by exploring the teacher construct readers are able to consider how popular fiction and film have influenced society's understandings and views of classroom teachers organized around four main themes identifying

with the teacher image constructing the teacher with content imaging the teacher as savior the teacher construct as commentary the chapters examine the complicated mixture of fact stereotype and misrepresentation that create the image of the teacher in the public eye today this examination in turn allows teacher educators to use popular culture as curriculum using the fictional teacher as a text preservice and practicing teachers can examine positive and negative and often misleading representations of teachers in order to develop as teachers themselves

mapping tokyo in fiction and film explores ways that late 20th and early 21st century fiction and film from japan literally and figuratively map tokyo the four dozen novels stories and films discussed here describe define and reflect on tokyo urban space they are part of the flow of japanese language texts being translated or in the case of film subtitled into english circulation in professionally translated and subtitled english language versions helps ensure accessibility to the primarily anglophone readers of this study and helps validate inclusion in lists of world literature and film tokyo s well established culture of mapping signifies much more than a profound attachment to place or an affinity for maps as artifacts it is importantly a counter response to feelings of insecurity and disconnection insofar as the mapping process helps impart a sense of predictability stability and placeness in the real and imagined city

when reality becomes fantastic what literary effects will render it credible or comprehensible to respond meaningfully to the surreality of the holocaust writers must produce works of moral and emotional complexity one way they have achieved this is through elements of fantasy covering a range of theoretical perspectives this collection of essays explores the use of fantastic story telling in holocaust literature and film writers such as jane yolen and art spiegelman are discussed as well as the sci fi television series v 1983 stephen king s novella apt pupil 1982 guillermo del toro s pan s labyrinth 2006 and martin scorsese s dark thriller shutter island 2010

palestinian literature and film in postcolonial feminist perspective is the first sustained study of gender consciousness in the palestinian creative imagination drawing on concepts from postcolonial feminist theory ball analyses a range of literary and filmic works by major creative practitioners including michel khleifi liana badr annemarie jacir elia suleiman mona hatoum and suheir hammad and reveals a hitherto unrecognized trajectory in gender consciousness under development in the palestinian imagination from the start of the twentieth century the book explores how these works resonate with questions of power identity nation resistance and self representation in the palestinian imagination more broadly and asks how these gender conscious narratives transform our understanding of palestine s struggle for postcoloniality working at the cusp of postcolonial feminist and cultural enquiry ball seeks to open up vital new directions in the interdisciplinary study of palestine

thesis m a from the year 2005 in the subject american studies literature grade 1 7 humboldt university of berlin 39 entries in the bibliography language english abstract the ku klux klan and its racist doctrine have a long history in his work backfire how the ku klux klan helped the civil rights movement david chalmers calls the klan as america s only enduring political terrorist movement the following paper will mainly focus on the presentation of the klan in thomas dixon s southern reconstruction novel the clansman and d w griffith s movie the birth of a nation as well as in contemporary american literature and films in that context the klan s prejudices against african americans will be discussed in connection with karen hesse s children book one also has to take prejudices against jews into account the analysis of ku klux klan literature and films will cover three important klan eras beginning in 1887 until the 1960s different types of texts and films will be set in context with different cultural aspects of that time all together one cannot directly speak of an influence of dixon s work on later klan literature and films but the presence of some similar motives in all novels and films which will be taken into account shows an important aspect that will be the main point of this paper regardless of a pro klan or a political neutral work of fiction one can recognise either a conscious or an unconscious hero worship of the klan or at least a representation of the klan s immense political and social power one has to assume that different books and films indeed help to create a klan myth throughout the paper different motives will be compared to strengthen this thesis

this book explores italian science fiction from 1861 the year of italy s unification to the present day focusing on how this genre helped shape notions of otherness and normalness in particular italian science fiction draws upon critical race studies postcolonial theory and feminist studies to explore how migration colonialism multiculturalism and racism have been represented in genre film and literature topics include the role of science fiction in constructing a national identity the representation and self representation of alien immigrants in italy the creation of internal others such as southerners and roma the intersections of gender and race discrimination and italian science fiction s transnational dialogue with foreign science fiction this book reveals that though it is arguably a minor genre in italy science fiction offers an innovative interpretive angle for rethinking italian history and imagining future change in italian society

the prevailing view is that existentialism is a product of post world war ii europe and had no significant presence in the united states before the 1940s jean paul sartre and associates are credited with establishing the philosophy in france and later introducing it to americans but conventional wisdom about existentialism in the united states is mistaken the united states actually developed its own unique brand of existentialism several years before sartre and company published their first existentialist works film noir and the hard boiled fiction that served as its initial source material represent one form of american existentialism that was produced independently of european philosophy hard boiled fiction introduced the tough and savvy private detective the duplicitous femme fatale the innocent victim of circumstance and the confessing but remorseless murderer creators of this uniquely american crime genre engaged existential themes of isolation anxiety futility and death in the thrilling context of the urban crime thriller the film noir cycle of hollywood cinema brought these features to the screen and offered a distinctively dark visual

style compatible with the unorthodox narrative techniques of hard boiled fiction writers film noir has gained critical acceptance for its artistic merit and the term has a ubiquitous presence in american culture americans have much to gain by recognizing their own contributors to the history of existentialism existentialism film noir and hard boiled fiction describes and celebrates a unique form of existentialism produced mostly by and for working class people faison s analysis of the existentialist value of early twentieth century crime stories and films illustrates that philosophical ideas are available from a rich diversity of sources faison examines the plight of philosophy which occupies a small corner of the academy and is largely ignored beyond its walls according to the author philosophers do themselves and the public a disservice when they restrict what is called existentialism or philosophy to that which the academy traditionally approves the tendency to limit the range of sanctioned material led the professional community to miss the philosophical importance of the critically acclaimed phenomenon known as film noir and significantly contributes to the contemporary status of philosophy existentialism film noir and hard boiled fiction properly identifies existentialism not as the original creation of post world war ii europeans but as a shorthand term used to describe a compelling vision of the world the themes associated with existentialism are found in the ancient greek tragedies and dramatic narrative has been the preferred conveyance of the existentialist message american and european philosophers present during the early decades of the twentieth century agreed that the united states was not fertile soil for the existentialist message but the popularity of hard boiled fiction and film noir contradicts such claims faison examines and emphasizes the working class origins and orientation of hard boiled fiction to reveal the division between elites and working class americans that led to the ill informed conclusion faison effectively challenges the frequent assertion that the intellectual and creative sources of film noir are to be found in european thinkers and movements and establishes film noir like hard boiled fiction as a uniquely american phenomenon existentialism film noir and hard boiled fiction is scholarly and accessible and will appeal to academics interested in existentialism philosophy and interdisciplinary studies film enthusiasts interested in the narrative and visual techniques employed in film noir and fans of hard boiled mystery fiction and the work of screen legends of the hollywood studio era

when watching the latest instalment of batman it is perfectly normal to say that we see batman fighting bane or that we see bruce wayne making love to miranda tate we would not say that we see christian bale dressed up as batman going through the motions of punching tom hardy dressed up as bane nor do we say that we see christian bale pretending to be bruce wayne making love with marion cotillard who is

playacting the role miranda tate but if we look at the history of cinema and consider contemporary reviews from the early days of the medium we see that people thought precisely in this way about early film they spoke of film as no more than documentary recordings of actors performing on set in an innovative combination of philosophical aesthetics and new cinema history mario slugan investigates how our default imaginative engagement with film changed over the first two decades of cinema it addresses not only the importance of imagination for the understanding of early cinema but also contributes to our understanding of what it means for a representational medium to produce fictions specifically slugan argues that cinema provides a better model for understanding fiction than literature

gathering together work by leading teachers and researchers in the field this book explores a rapidly growing area of the curriculum holocaust literature and film it addresses demanding seminar room and institutional practicalities as well as exploring a range of conceptual and theoretical issues and problems
