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when movies replaced theater in the early twentieth century live drama was wide open to reform a rebellion against commercialism called the little theatre movement promoted the notion that theatre is a valuable form of self expression composing ourselves argues that the movement was a national phenomenon that resulted in lasting ideas for serious theatre that are now ordinary parts of the american cultural landscape

irish theatre in the twenty first century is the first in depth study of the subject it analyses the ways in which theatre in ireland has developed since the 1990s with emerging playwrights martin mcdonagh conor mcpherson and enda walsh companies such as blue raincoat the corn exchange and pan pan pioneered an avant garde dramaturgy this led to new styles of production of classic irish works including the plays of synge mounted by druid there was a re imagining of past irish history in the work of rough magic and anu plays by owen mccafferty stacey gregg and david ireland dramatized the legacy of the troubles and adaptations of greek tragedy by marina carr and others reflecting the conditions of modern ireland from 2015 the movement waking the feminists led to a sharpened awareness of gender while male playwrights showed a toxic masculinity on the stage a generation of female dramatists including carr gregg and nancy harris gave voice to the long suppressed

experiences of women for three separate periods 2006 2016 and 2020 2 the author served as one of the judges for the Irish Times Irish Theatre Awards attending all new productions across the island of Ireland this allowed him to provide the overviews of the state of play of Irish theatre in each of those times which punctuate the book drawing also on interviews with Ireland's leading theatre makers Grene provides readers with a close up understanding of Irish theatre in a period when Ireland became for the first time a fully modernized secular and multi ethnic society

David Mamet full length comedy characters 3 male 1 non speaking bare stage the Pulitzer Prize winning author of *Glengarry Glen Ross* and *Speed the Plow* takes us into the lives of two actors John Young and rising into the first flush of his success the other Robert older anxious and beginning to wane in a series of short spare and increasingly raw exchanges we see the estrangement of youth from age and the wider inevitable and

to call something modern is to assert something fundamental about the social cultural economic and technical sophistication of that thing over and against what has come before a cultural history of theatre in the modern age provides an interdisciplinary overview of theatre and performance in their social and material contexts from the late 19th century through the early 2000s emphasizing key developments and trends that both exemplify and trouble the various meanings of the term modern and the identity of modernist theatre and performance highly illustrated with 40 images the ten chapters each take a different theme as their focus institutional frameworks social functions sexuality and gender the environment of theatre circulation interpretations communities of production repertoire and genres technologies of performance and knowledge transmission

offering one of the first scholarly examinations of digital and distanced performance since the global shutdown of theaters in March 2020 Barbara Fuchs provides both a record of the changes and a framework for thinking through theater's transformation though born of necessity recent productions offer a new world of practice from multi platform plays on Zoom WhatsApp and Instagram to enhancement via filters and augmented reality to urban distanced theater that enlivens streetscapes and building courtyards based largely outside the commercial theater these productions transcend geographic and financial barriers to access new audiences while offering a lifeline to artists this study charts how virtual theater puts pressure on existing assumptions and definitions transforming the conditions of both theater making and viewership how are participatory site specific or devised theater altered under physical distancing requirements how do digital productions blur the line between film and theater what does liveness mean in a time of pandemic in its seven chapters theater of lockdown focuses on digital and distanced productions from the Americas Europe and Australia offering scholarly analysis and interviews productions examined include theater in quarantine's closet work in New York forced entertainment's Sheffield UK End Meeting for All i ii and iii the work of Madrid based company Grumelot and the virtuosic showmanship of Efe Tres in Mexico City

stage money is a groundbreaking guide to understanding professional theater finances today through the use of the tools and metaphors of the business world at large this approach results in a comprehensive picture of the economic realities of theater production that is radically different from the assessments typically espoused elsewhere tim donahue and jim patterson combine their experiences in the financial and creative aspects of theater production to present in straightforward prose their keen insights into the micro and macro economic aspects of the commercial stage tangible data charts and graphs are counterbalanced with illuminating intermissions between chapters and interspersed sidebars throughout to provide specific examples of key concepts collectively presenting an expansive overview of the contemporary theater business stage money is an unparalleled tool for theater professionals and enthusiasts interested in garnering a better understanding of the business s inner workings at present and its challenges for the future among the topics addressed in stage money are the risks and returns on broadway in the early twenty first century the financial organization of theater performances today and comparisons between the business models of commercial theater and not for profit theater in concise language and clear examples the authors explain where the money comes from and where it goes

the idea of american musical theatre conjures up images of bright lights and big city but its lifeblood is found in local and amateur productions at schools community theatres summer camps and more in beyond broadway author stacy wolf considers the widespread presence and persistence of musical theatre in u s culture and examines it as a live pleasurable participatory experience of creating watching and listening why does local musical theatre flourish in america why do so many americans passionately engage in a century old artistic practice that requires intense person to person collaboration why do audiences flock to see musicals in their hometowns how do corporations like disney and music theatre international enable musical theatre s energetic movement through american culture touring from maine to california wolf visits elementary schools a middle school performance festival afterschool programs high schools summer camps state park outdoor theatres community theatres and dinner theatres and conducts over 200 interviews with practitioners and spectators licensors and disney creatives in beyond broadway wolf tells the story of musical theatre s abundance and longevity in the u s as a thriving joyful activity that touches millions of lives
